## **ToolBox Talks from the SWPA Safety Committee**



It's the LAW...No commercial motor vehicle shall be driven unless the driver thereof shall have satisfied himself that the following parts and accessories are in good working order.

**INSPECT it** — **LOG it** — So, what should a pre-trip inspection checklist include? Here are some of the most common items, record your inspections and save them. **It's your responsibility!** 

Inspect the engine compartment. 
☐ Radiator ☐ Air compressor ☐ Steering gearbox ☐ Steering linkage ☐ Water pump ☐ Alternator Belts ☐ Houses & Wiring

Inspect the fuel tank and battery. 

✓ Visual check of your fuel tank and battery area to make sure nothing is cracked or leaking 

✓ Check battery levels to ensure you have enough starting power and charges are holding

Inspect the fluids. ⊠ Check for fluid leaks by looking under the truck for signs of fluid on the ground, including: ⊠ Fuel Oil ⊠ Coolant Power ⊠ Steering fluid ⊠ Brake fluid ⊠ Windshield washer fluid

Inspect the brakes. 

A proper pre-trip inspection will include inspecting the brake system both in-cab and externally.

Check the brake adjustment with the slack adjuster for proper alignment 

Check brake linings for appropriate thickness 

Check air lines aren't damaged, don't leak, and are properly sealed 

Brake checks should include air brakes, parking brakes, and hydraulic braking systems

Inspect the tires. ☒ Tire tread for safe operation. ☒ Check for cuts, bubbles, or gouges. ☒ Check for foreign objects, such as stones or large debris, between the wheels and no space between tires and rims ☒ Check & maintain the appropriate air pressure ☒ Inspect the wheel lug nuts ☒ Tighten any loose wheel fasteners

Inspect the coupling system. 

Pay particular attention to your kingpin and the sliding fifth wheel locking pin

Apron 

Electrical connections 

Gap 

Glad hands 

Locking jaws 

Mounting bolt 

Platform 

Release arm 

Skid plate

Inspect the lights and reflectors. ☑ Check that lights, warning lights, and turn signals are working properly, and lenses are clean for maximum visibility ☑ Make sure your truck's reflectors are free of any dirt or debris, They should be intact without cracks, missing pieces, or peeling. Replace when needed.

Inspect the trailer. Look for any mechanical defects. 

☐ Headboard ☐ Frame ☐ Release pins ☐ Crossmembers
☐ Release handles ☐ Locking pins ☐ Doors and hinges

Inspect the cab. ☒ Check seatbelts for any signs of wear or fray and ensure a snug fit. ☒ Check your windshield wipers and horn ☒ Check the operation and functionality of your inside and outside mirrors ☒ Seat position, ☒ Steering wheel, and pedals ☒ Check windshield for cracks or chips ☒ Perform a safe start to make sure lights and turn signals are working properly. This includes ABS lights and gauges. ☒ Inspect the emergency kit ☒ Check Fire Extinguisher, to make sure it is charged and secured ☒ Warning devices for stopped vehicles, such as bidirectional reflective triangles
